FARE has been tireless in our efforts to combat alcohol harm, educating communities and advocating for reform.

PROTECTING KIDS ONLINE

In September FARE hosted an event at Parliament House in Canberra to brief political leaders and policy makers on how online marketing is preying on children via digital environments, including esports. This space is inundated with



covert, ungated, highly targeted marketing, giving alcohol companies unrestricted contact with children and adolescents. FARE is asking the Commonwealth Government to make it a top priority to introduce legal protections to stop alcohol and other unhealthy products from directly targeting vulnerable people, especially children.

VICTORY IN THE NT

We received fantastic news that the NT Liquor Commission had decided to reject Woolworths' plans to build a Dan Murphy's in Darwin. If approved, the Darwin Dan Murphy's would have been one of Australia's biggest, guaranteeing the cheapest alcohol in a place that holds the national record for alcohol-related harm. In the past few years the NT Government has undertaken a substantial program of reform to reduce alcohol-fuelled harm and we are pleased that this decision supports these reforms.

INQUIRY INTO FASD

On International FASD Day on 9 September, Federal Senator Stirling Griff called for a fresh Senate inquiry into Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD). It's hoped that the call will bring about greater investment in preventive education programs and greater support for those living with the disability.

GROUNDSWELL OF SUPPORT TO END ALCOHOL ADVERTIS

More than 1,100 End Alcohol Advertising in Sport campaign supporters across Australia have written to their local politicians and the Australian Communications and Media Authority to demand an end to the exemption allowing alcohol companies target Aussie kids. This activity coincided with an event at Parliament House on 11 September, In their sights: The dark arts of digital alcohol marketing, hosted by FARE, brought together leading Australian academics, public health advocates, politicians and policy makers to discuss the challenges of today's rapidly changing digital marketing landscape and the need for regulation to protect young people.

The event launched Australian-first research into unhealthy advertising

and sponsorship in the exploding esports competitive video gaming arena. Attendees were presented with indisputable evidence of the impact of repeated exposure to alcohol and other harmful advertising on young people, and their lack of media literacy to effectively identify and critique such marketing tactics.

VICTORY IN THE NT!

FARE has been working with Darwin community groups for more than a year to mount an objection to Woolworths' plans to build a super-size Dan Murphy's in the NT. On Friday 20 September the NT Liquor Commission announced its ruling and Dan Murphy's was rejected.

This ruling is a decision in favour of local communities and the health and safety of the Territory.

The NT Liquor Commission listed a number of concerns about the proposed Dan Murphy's including that it would increase the risk of alcohol-related harm in nearby Aboriginal communities.

The proposed site is down the road from Darwin's largest Aboriginal community at Bagot, and within two kilometres of two other communities, Kulaluk and Minmarama. There are significant existing high levels of alcohol-related problems, including domestic violence and other crimes in that area and introducing a big box discount liquor shop like Dan Murphy's would have been

disastrous for the surrounding communities. We are glad to see the NT Liquor Commission agreed.

However, it seems our politicians are still not taking alcohol harm seriously. NT Chief Minister Michael Gunner made a statement after the ruling, saying that he wanted to see a Dan Murphy's in Darwin and that he would support Woolworths to find an alternate site for the liquor barn.

Our fight is not over.

We will continue to work with NT communities to protect them from the industry's relentless, predatory marketing of cheap packaged liquor. And we will not rest until all politicans across Australia comprehend the full extent of alcohol harm, and side with the community instead of greedy corporates.

Thank you for being part of our advocacy work across Australia.


SING IN SPORT

INQUIRYANNOUNCED ON INTERNATIONAL FASD DAY

We were pleased to see Senator Stirling Griff call for a Senate Select Committee inquiry into Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD), on 9 September, International FASD Awareness Day.

FARE has been advocating for greater awareness of FASD for many years and your support for our recent FASD fundraising appeal has enabled this work to continue.

FASD is the leading cause of preventable disability in Australia and a priority issue for FARE. Australia has one of the highest rates of alcohol use during pregnancy in the world, and FASD is estimated to affect up to 5 per cent of the Australian population - a staggering number for a disability that is preventable through community education and support.

The National Drug Strategy Household Survey 2016 found one in four pregnant women in Australia



continued to drink alcohol after knowledge of their pregnancy.

We hope that a parliamentary inquiry will address the prevalence of FASD, gaps in education programs and diagnostic services, and support for people living with FASD and their carers.

Thank you for supporting FARE's FASD advocacy work. With your support we will continue to work to ensure no more children are born with this preventable disability.
